## Highest-paid county official resigns as head of health services

Dr. Bruce Chernof, the highest-paid county official as head of the Los Angeles County Department of Health Services, announced his resignation Thursday.

Chernof, who took over the department in 2006 after the resignation of Thomas Garthwaite, said he will head a new private foundation.

Chernof was the fourth director to hold the job since 1995, when the

health department's financial woes nearly dragged the county into bankruptcy. He also became the highest-paid county official, earning \$323,906 last year.

"It has been a remarkable journey that I have shared with my 21,000 DHS colleagues," Chernof said in a statement.

"Although some people consider this the most difficult job in health care, they don't get to see firsthand the outstanding doctors, nurses and

other staff who care for the residents of the county with compassion, clinical excellence and commitment."

He inherited various problems, including unusually high patient deaths at Martin Luther King Jr.-Drew Medical Center and a \$1.4 billion deficit.

Earlier this year, Chernof and his staff were berated by the county Board of Supervisors after presenting a plan that involved closing all but one of the county's dozen health clinics in a \$291 million department shortfall. Also under Chernof, emergency room operations ceased at King-Harbor Hospital after the center failed a critical inspection by state regulators.

Chernof plans to be the founding chief executive officer of a foundation that will focus on information technology, education, research and policy related to health care for senior citizens.

Officials did not say who will replace him.
